The COVID-19 pandemic that broke out in Israel in February 2020 prompted widespread public response, which included a deluge of humorous memes. Our research project includes an extensive collection of these digital narratives (so far we have collected 2200 images and texts) and saving them by distribution dates and topics. The collection is very rich and it represents various groups in Israeli society. We hope it will serve a variety of scholars, and it has already yielded one article dealing with Israeli humor during the pandemic.

Lockdown Lore Collection Project

The Lockdown Lore Collection Project is documenting Scotland's creative responses to the pandemic. In addition to conducting over sixty long-form interviews with people about life during the pandemic, we have received a wide variety of submissions from around Scotland and beyond. These include photos of street art and handmade objects among other things, as well as films, songs, instrumental tunes, poems, diary entries, and descriptions of digital initiatives started during the pandemic. Once the project is closed and the contributions are fully catalogued, they will be made more widely available according to permissions given by the contributors.




Catching Stories: Oral History for Health

How might oral testimony and personal stories enrich our understanding of the societal impact of infectious diseases in the 20th and 21st centuries? How might folklore and ethnology approaches and resources interact with public health and health education practice and vaccine hesitancy? The Cork Folklore Project has launched its 'Catching Stories' resource, which hosts oral testimony, disease and vaccination history, and social-historical ephemera relating to the theme. We will develop the project throughout 2021-2022, in collaboration with the public and health practitioners, in an exploration of what our materials and methods can bring to public health initiatives.

This was the CFP's first time using text questionnaires since its establishment in 1996, and we were impressed by the richness of the responses. Finland stänger! Hur påverkar Corona dig? / Finland is closing down! How does Corona effect you?

A questionnaire exploring how the pandemic lockdown was experienced. The questionnaire gauged reactions to the Government's decisions and examined what media outlets respondents used in following the situation. Other questions concerned how everyday life changed during the lockdown, how patterns of consumption altered, how contacts with friends and family were maintained and how the pandemic affected working life. Moreover, the questionnaire asked about Corona folklore and concerns for the future.

A collection of photos and recordings of life in Finland during the spring and summer of 2020. What does the cityscape look like? What became emblematic for the lockdown and how was contact maintained while maintaining social distance?

Latviešu buramvārdu digitālais katalogs / Digital Catalogue of Latvian Charms

The Digital Catalogue of Latvian Charms consists of materials from the charm and folk medicine genres held within the Latvian Folklore Archives. The charm collection is largely made up of folklore materials submitted to the archive in the 1920s and 30s. The digital classification system consists of a division into functional groups according to charm type and allows users to search for charms by category or smaller distinctions in content and form. The Digital Catalogue of Latvian Charms began to be formed in October 2017 and is co-financed within the framework of the European Regional Development Fund (No. 1.1.1.2/VIAA/1/16/217).

ידוהי זכרמב ןמית ידוהי / Yemeni Tradition at The Hebrew University's Folklore Research Center

The Folklore Research Center at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem was established in 1970 by Prof. Dov Noy. Among its collections are folklore materials that were collected from Yemeni informants, including ethnographic interviews, audio tracks, films and photos, documenting folk dances, folk songs, ceremonies, and folk medicine. This project re-contextualizes these materials, through connections with the researchers, the Yemeni community and the informants' families. The new context is added to the archival record, while the old records create new interactions with the Yemeni community, becoming an important part of its cultural heritage.

Tervise hoidmine koroonakriisi ajal / Keeping healthy during the corona crisis

We collected answers from our network of correspondents on their health and economic situation during the lockdown of spring 2020. We received 36 answers via online survey, e-mail, snail mail and a group of life story writes active under the Estonian Folklore Archives. The majority of respondents stayed healthy with constant connections to family and friends, walks in nature and hand work, reading etc. A few respondents from younger generation admitted to have experienced anxiety during the lockdown. Most respondents had families bringing them food or had their own supplies, especially people from remote corners of the country. People used over-the counter medicine, some folk medicine to cure cold (tea, garlic, breathing in potato steam), but had trouble with their teeth since getting to dentist was tricky. There was some fear of catching Covid, especially if chronic illnesses would have brought the respondents to hospital. The general mood of the respondents remained positive, however. In addition, Covid-related folklore was collected on the Facebook page of our archive.
