



## Introduction

The Early Career Researchers (ECRs) Session aims to engage researchers in discussions on research topics that cut across the [4 FaNSI programmes](#). Invited speakers will share their experience **leading interdisciplinary research** and **transforming research to action**. The two chosen themes are not only pertinent to early career researchers as they develop their research portfolio, collaborative partnerships, and research practices, but also to established research scientists, multi-sectoral research teams, and decision-makers who seek transformative change.

Presentations and Q&A will be followed by a 15-minute break-out session to facilitate small group discussions under each theme. A general discussion on the emerging challenges and opportunities that ECRs face and on actions to create a supportive hub (FaNSI ECR network) will form seedlings for future FaNSI ECR events. Session participants are invited to share their own reflections and to draw out implications for future research and practice.
